Studies at Städelschule emphasize the artistic work done within the framework of the professors' classes. These are accompanied by courses, seminars, and lectures.

Fine Art students must complete 6 courses in Practice and 6 seminars in Theory during the first 6 semesters. After successfully completing a course or seminar, students receive a Course Certificate from the professor, instructor, or guest professor, which must be handed in at the student office (Studierendensekretariat).

It is possible to be exempted from the attendance requirements of Practice and Theory. Students requesting an exemption must bring to the student office documentation of successful completion of equivalent classes at another institution. A retroactive exemption is not possible.

An intermediate exam is required between the second and fourth semester, during which students will present and discuss their artistic work. Students wishing to take the intermediate exam after the fourth semester will only be allowed to take it once. The intermediate exam is used to decide about a student's further studies at the Städelschule.

**T03. Lecture-series with Presentations:
The Value of Art Under Different Circumstances:
Value-reflexive Artistic Practices in the 20th and 21st century**

During this lecture-seminar we will examine the current “system change” of the art economy in a historical perspective.

When the first ‘lockdown’ caused by the global pandemic took place in March 2020 sociologist Sighard Neckel noted a “complete interruption of the value creation chains.” Production, investment and consumption had indeed come to an almost complete standstill. What resulted from this development was a flight of all kinds of businesses into the digital sphere – a tendency that also occurred in the artworld where many galleries opened so called online showrooms. While the art market certainly recovered from this crisis – it has only increased its pace and managed to intensify its global sales volume in 2022 and 2023 – this recovery came with a price. Many of the art world’s formerly analogue infrastructures – such as its distribution system – were overtaken by digital platforms like Instagram. Here, success gets measured by numbers (the number of clicks or followers) and not by content-related criteria. It was also after the pandemic that “Spec-u-lectors” – Kenny Schaechter’s term for collectors who by art only as an investment – entered the game in large numbers. While the older “collector as connoisseur”- type died out, spec-u-lectors bought art works like assets. At the same time Criticism became increasingly marginalized especially in the auction sphere. This implied that the high prices at auctions were not backed up by the symbolic value generated by critics and art historians. The rise of right-wing populism, wars and climate catastrophes furthermore shattered those “fictional expectations” and “imagined futures” (Jens Beckert) that are crucial for the creation of value. This caused a crisis of confidence and collectors started to buy much less while referring to the “current climate”. Some galleries, like Blum in Los Angeles, had to close due to what its owner Tim Blum aptly described as “a system that is no longer working.” He probably also referred to the increased power of auction houses that sold formerly expensive works for much lower prices which destroyed the careers of many artists and put galleries under pressure who had to face disappointed clients.

We will start this lecture-series by examining why artworks are commodities of a special kind. We will also consider how the process of value-creation can stand on shaky grounds under different historical circumstances. We will furthermore investigate the special nature of artistic labour – how it overlaps with general labour while remaining different from it.

My theoretical propositions will always be interspersed with the close reading and analysis of what I consider to be “value-reflexive” artworks—from Duchamp’s *Tsanck Cheque* (1919) to Jutta Koether’s painting *Fly Now* (2022), from Piero Manzoni’s *Merda d’artista* (1961) to Adrian Piper’s *Self Portrait Exaggerating my Negroid Features* (1981), from Yves Klein’s *Zone de Sensibilité Picturale Immatérielle* (1959) to Andrea Fraser’s *Untitled* (2003). I will finally also consider those artistic practices which negotiate the processes of value-discrimination (against female, gender-non-conforming or Black artists) that occur in some segments of the commercial realm of the artworld to this day.

We will analyse these practices and situate them in their respective social and economic environment. By combining a contextual-sociohistorical approach with close readings and case studies I aim to demonstrate in this lecture-series how we can only understand what is at stake in an artistic practice if we situate it historically and if we approximately reconstruct its social and economic conditions. These conditions are of course not objectively given, but one can try to capture them retroactively.

These lectures-series will be interspersed with short presentations given by students. They will introduce a “value-reflexive” practice in the form of a case study.

T04. GROUP CRITS: How to Present and Discuss my Work

Due to high demand I decided to keep offering group-crit sessions in the winter term 2025/26. Dates will be announced. The group crits aim at reflecting on how artists (and curators) present and discuss their work. They also aim at discussing (and critiquing) the presented works in the framework of the group. Opting for the group as the site for these discussions is a way of acknowledging what Judith Butler pointed out in “The Force of Non-Violence” (2020): that “selves are implicated in each other’s lives (bound by a set of relations that can be as destructive as they can be sustaining”. By exposing our works to other “selves” we thus acknowledge how our selves (and our works correspondingly) are constituted through their relationships with others. In order to keep the “destructive” potential of these relationships in check, I propose several strategies such as dividing the group into a pro and a con-voice that switches at some point. While discussing the presented works we will relate them to those historical artistic practices that are evoked by them. But we will also investigate how the presented works intervene into the contemporary field of artistic possibilities and discourses. The group will focus on what it perceives as the strong points of the work and also on its potential problems. Its participants will form a kind of “micro-public” that makes situational (and always disputable) value judgments. The existence of such a public was presupposed by Modern Art since its emergence in the 18th century. Indeed: the Parisian “salons” first provided these publics to art—a public that was quite diverse in terms of class, but also characterized by its nationalist, racist and heteronormative orientations. We will try to form

another more plural and diverse public – a public that allows for inner conflicts and produces value judgments that are situated and provisional. In other words: what we will say about the presented works will never be the last word about them. But while acknowledging the limits of our value judgments we will also claim a situated non-normative validity for them.

This theoretical and practice-based workshop for Curatorial Studies and Fine Arts students will critically address issues of mediation within the framework of Städelschule's major yearly event, the Rundgang – the Open Studio days where Fine Art students present their works to a larger public within the context of their studio spaces.

The goal is to collectively develop and organize a mediation program for the Rundgang 2026 that reflects the specific context of the school and allows for encounters and scenarios of dialogue between the artists, the school, and its various publics.

We will discuss the promise and potential of an Open Studio and how the performativity of its inherent public moment invites us to think about representational frameworks, artistic labour and the experience of viewing and engaging with art.

This workshop will take place in two parts. In the first meeting in November we will engage in critical and active readings and key examples of past and present initiatives of art mediation within various exhibition contexts, ranging from local institutional practices to artistic and experimental forms of mediating and curating art from various international perspectives, with a focus on educational frameworks. We will be looking at examples where the mediation of art strives to be a transformative

process at the forefront of institutional change, both working with and transgressing the immediacy of the event. This will include reading texts and speaking with curators, educators, and artists, invested in art the mediation, curatorial challenges, and the potential and role of art schools for the mediation of art.

In the second part of the workshop (December–January), we will develop a mediation program for the Rundgang 2026 (February 6–8). Actively following the development and curatorial planning of the Rundgang / Open Studio Days with the Kunstkoordination, we will look at and discuss the nature of the Rundgang, the potential of its format, and the people it involves. What happens when a place of work and production turns public? What does hospitality mean in a moment of experimentation and competitiveness? How can we shape the Rundgang to promote cultural inclusion and foster public engagement on a deeper level? What should happen after Rundgang? And how can we connect this event to other public programming throughout the year?

Every decision is made according to conscious or unconscious, explicit or implicit criteria. All criteria hold and reflect systems of value, which exist within specific economies. In the field of art, these economies often correspond to distributions of different forms of power. The Politics of Criteria seminar will start with reading and discussion examining of the field of art, the criteria of its various subfields, and the values those criteria reflect. The seminar will proceed with individual and group processes to focus, understand, and reflect on the criteria and values that orient and define the practices of each participant and their relationships to different social and psychological structures.

This intensive three-week laboratory examines how memory, spirituality, ecology, ritual, absence, and archives shape contemporary artistic practice.

With a central emphasis on absence as presence, the course considers how what has disappeared or remains unseen—such as an extinct species, a vanished sea, or an invisible archive—continues to inform and transform cultural memory, imagination, and artistic form.

Through screenings, readings, collective exercises, fieldwork, and experimental studio practice, students will investigate non-linear storytelling, ritual gestures, ecological disappearance, and the unseen.

The course emphasizes intuitive research methods that blur the boundaries between documentary, fiction, and ritual, while foregrounding ecology, spirituality, disappearance, and the Mundus Imaginalis—the imaginal realm between visible and invisible—as critical frameworks for contemporary practice.

At its core, the course advances the proposition that absence does not equate to erasure.

Rather, absence generates its own forms of presence, exerting an ongoing influence on how art is conceived, experienced, and remembered.

The first week of the seminar is open, while the second week is conceptualized for a smaller fixed group of 10 to 15 students.

The course will reflect on curating and sculpture, through a single work. To enter the 13th Berlin Biennale at the KW Institute for Contemporary Art in Berlin, one did so

via a staircase mimicking a stairway in East Jerusalem, which lies in the occupied Palestinian territories. It builds on the original stair's unique legislation that was formalised in Berlin in 1878. The signatories of that special international legislation, brought together by Otto von Bismarck, loom over the stairway – their successors Turkey, Austria, Hungary, Russia recognise the statehood of Palestine, while the United Kingdom, France, Italy and Germany do not. The Stairway is the work of the artist Margherita Moscardini, who first alerted us to this Berlin Treaty. Armin Linke photographed the painting of this conference that hangs in Berlin's town hall.

If this staircase had legal personhood, it would be state-less. In front of the two-states, one-state solution, Moscardini recalls an old resolution, the UN resolution 181 (II), 1947, based on the Berlin Treaty, where the internationalization of a city – or of a few architectures – suggested a special, non-state, free-state, a-territorial government. The international commoning of this staircase, via legal acrobatics, places the stairway under a legislation model based on the common heritage of mankind, albeit its recognition in international law is still to be tested. Hence in an event during the course of the exhibition, we put The Stairway on trial. The walkable sculpture was also used as a stage. In one event, Lawrence Liang reflected that if for Romantic poet Shelley, the poet is the unacknowledged legislator of the world, the poet George Oppen's variation describes the stairway one better: Poets are the legislators of the unacknowledged world.

Six stones – numbered: 8, 39, 250, 328, 281, 370, quarried in Puglia, and cut by an anarchist collective in Carrara – will travel from the custodianship of the Berlin Biennale to the custodianship of the Städel Schule for the duration of our course. The stones will give us an opportunity to reflect on ideas of contemporary sculpture, and therefore the implications of this on curating today, and the form of exhibiting that could hold propositional, processual, performative works such as this one. We will also consider similar works in contemporary art. We will seek 6 signatories for the stones' accompanying certificates – from individuals, to space stations, to quantum physics centres, to ocean floor authorities – depending on the research interests and urgencies of the students, to create a “stateless” platform. At the same time, the class will divide into groups and think of the various potentialities of such a sculpture, through different events and actions that could happen with the stones, on the stones, thinking of how they might put them in use, and what a stateless walkable sculpture may enable. These final events could take place during the Open Studios, if wished for by the participating students.
